The show is a local community non-profitmaking event, and has been for the last 140 years. The support from donations and volunteers helps to keep the show running. Costs for printing the schedules, judges, hall hire, trophies and rosettes, tombola and raffle prizes refreshments are all paid for from sponsorship and proceeds of the show and any surplus will be used either to replace show equipment or to help fund local village good causes. However, the heart of the show is not about how much money we make, but about the community coming together and entering into the spirit of light-hearted competition, admiring the different exhibits (or checking out the competition), winning on the tombola/raffle or simply enjoying a cup of tea and a homemade cake and catching up on village gossip!

OPEN ART

Market Harborough Artists Cluster is an informal collective of about 30 artists working in Harborough and surrounding villages.

The group will be pleased to welcome visitors to their exhibition and sale of works at Market Harborough Theatre. View the wide range of inspiring paintings, art work, photography, collage and ceramics on Saturday and Sunday, September 17th and 18th from 10.00am to 5.00pm.

Admission is free. Refreshments will be available. All of the high quality work on display will be available to purchase.

Meanwhile, village artist, David Dunmore will open his own studio at Orchard House, 14 Mowsley Road for visitors to view his paintings and watch the artist at work!

David paints in watercolours and his work includes detailed botanical studies, natural forms and landscapes inspired by walks in the British countryside. David's open studio will on Saturday, September 17th and Sunday, 18th, 10.00am to 5.00pm.

Ami Becker will also be opening her studio at 24 Hunters Close, showcasing her works in bright colourful acrylic combinations, which include natural and abstract forms. Ami's studio will be open on September 10th and 11th, 10.00am to 4.00pm.

Ami and David will also be joining with members of the Northamptonshire Open Studios, alongside 160 artists at 82 venues, who will be opening their studios and showing their works.

The event launches at Lamport Hall with a Central Exhibition featuring works from many of the artists on Friday September 2nd, which runs until September 25th.

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Willowherbs - Rosebay and Great Hairy Chamaenerion Angustifolium and Epilobium Hirsutum

A two-for-one article this month... Willowherbs are common wildflowers that flourish in open spaces. While they are similar in height and colouring, they are easily identified. Surprisingly, early in the 18th century, rosebay was considered a rare flower. However, land clearance for railways and Second World War bomb craters provided the perfect environment for the



plant to thrive. Indeed, in the southeast, it's known as 'bombweed' and its remarkable ability to re-establish vegetation in barren landscapes is even used in areas damaged by oil spills. The eye-catching spike of pink flowers matures into pods that release thousands of fluffy seeds to the four winds, and it is a characteristic of these seeds that they remain viable in the soil for a year or two; awaiting their chance to germinate.

The Giant Hairy Willowherb, as its name suggests, is the tallest willowherb and its robust stalks are covered in downy hairs. It grows best in damp, open locations. Both it, and rosebay, grow around the pond in our Millennium Wood. Its large purple-pink flowers have four notched petals and a prominent four-lobed white stigma. To avoid self-fertilisation, the pistil emerges, and following pollination, the stigma is replaced with stamens. An assortment of insects pollinate the flower, which, in common with the rosebay, produces legions of fluffy wind-dispersed seeds. The lance-shaped leaves are a food source for many beasties, including caterpillars of the glorious elephant hawkmoth.

Willowherbs have diverse therapeutic uses, notably as an astringent to clean infected wounds. Young shoots and flowers can be used, albeit sparingly, in salads, and their leaves are brewed to make the pleasant Russian tea 'kaporie'.

Finally, there's a superstition that picking willowherbs triggers thunderstorms. However, I wonder if this could be due to the coincidence of them blossoming in high summer during the thunderstorm season.

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

It is a truism that we don't know what we've lost until it has gone, [Ed: apologies to Joni Mitchell...] which is especially relevant when we consider the grand country houses that have been lost, often in living memory.

In Bosworth we have lost Highfields House and Fernie Lodge and, as we noted a while back, locally we lost the grand Edwin Lutyens and Gertrude Jeykill confection, Papillion Hall near Lubenham.

Closer to home, we lost the subject of this month's picture, Sulby Hall, a truly monumental pile by the renowned Neo-Classicist architect, Sir John Soane, built in 1792/3 and unceremoniously demolished in 1952. Soane was responsible for numerous great Regency country houses, the remodelling of the Bank of England in the City, Dulwich College Art

Gallery, and his design for his late wife's mausoleum inspired Sir Gilbert Scott's design for the red phone box...

A new book, *Sulby Hall*, by local historical author, Elizabeth Taylor, covers the history of Sulby Hall, its ornamental gardens and its residents from the creation of the building to its demolition over 150 years later.

The book sketches the lives

of the

colourful owners of the Hall throughout the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries and is illustrated with many previously unpublished photographs.



MORE BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

BOSWORTH SKY AT NIGHT

Astronomy from your Backyard


Humankind has looked up at the stars for thousands of years and made out shapes from the positions and locations of them - a kind of joining up of the dots to make a picture. They used common place objects in their lives to name these pictures and called each shape, or area of the sky, a constellation. Maybe because they had darker skies with no light pollution they could make out these shapes as what they depicted, such as Capricorn (the Goat) or Aquila (the Eagle). Despite practising astronomy for most of my life, I can see very few of these constellations as being the object they have named them by. There are a few though such as The Plough or Hercules that are recognisable and another of these, in my opinion, is the constellation Cygnus (the Swan). [See the diagram, right]

Also known as the Northern Cross, as it features a prominent crucifix asterism, Cygnus is located within the Milky Way and derives its name from the Latinized Greek word for swan. It is right overhead now in September and the swan seems to be flying towards the south-western horizon.

The bright red star in the diagram, on one of the swan's wings, is actually not

there at the moment but scientists predict it will appear sometime soon so keep a close eye on Cygnus over the next few months to spot this exploding star. Astronomers explain they have discovered a dim binary star 1,800 light years away at this location consisting of two suns closely orbiting each other. They are getting increasingly near to each other and when they collide it will produce a red nova stellar explosion making the system suddenly 10,000 times brighter and with a reddish tint. Glad I'll be nowhere near it when this happens! Watch the Husbands Bosworth Village face book page for details of another Village Star Party in September.

Report of the Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday, August 2nd 2022.

Present: 5 Councillors and two members of the public

Visitors' Questions

■Queries were raised in relation to the lack of waste bins. Clerk confirmed that three bins had been removed by HDC as a cost-cutting measure. Council resolved to review the provision of bins as an agenda item at the next meeting.

Minutes of the meeting held on Tuesday, June 7th 2022 were approved and signed as correct

Matters Arising

- ■Clerk confirmed that the documents relating to the external audit had been posted on the noticeboard on the Upper Green for parishioners to review.
- ■Clerk confirmed that planning permission has been approved for the remedial work required to the oak tree on the Lower Green. Work to be undertaken as soon as possible **Finance**
- ■Bank Statements and Cash Book reconciliation to date were presented for noting
- ■It was agreed that the daily internet banking limit be increased

Planning

■The June/July planning application summary was agreed as accurate

Grant Application - Husbands Bosworth Tots

■Bosworth Tots group had requested a grant to enable them to enhance their activities. Council noted that a grant could only be offered once the group had a bank account

Donation Approvals

■ Council approved donations to HB Millennium Woodland Trust, *Bosworth Bugle*, Turville Memorial Hall, Bosworth Causeway Charity and Citizens Advice Bureau

Parish Office

■Council noted a proposed increase in the rent due for the Parish Office. The increase was agreed

Allotments

■Council noted the poor condition of the entrance to the allotment site. It was agreed to address this within the 2022/3 Precept Funding Jubilee Memorial Bench

■After discussion,a bench, which will be sited on the Upper Green

Pavilion Pavement Lighting

■ Senior Lighting Engineer at LCC estimated that three lamps would be required. It was agreed to discuss this item further as part of the proposed development of the Sports Pavilion

Pathway to Theddingworth

■Council heard that since the proposed works to clear the pathway in the direction of Theddingworth would require road closures and other safety related measures it was not possible to progress this project at present. Clerk to contact LCC to establish a way forward Play Area/Skate park

Clerk was asked to obtain a quotation for the addition of a new 'nest' swing. After discussion, it was agreed to provide a new multipurpose waste /recycling bin for outside the Skate Park.

Parish Trees

■ Signs of Ash Die Back disease had been noted in a number of Parish Council owned trees. Whilst no immediate attention is necessary it was proposed that this would need to be considered as part of Precept Planning 2023/2024.

Cemetery

■Following the recent vandalism to the water tap, a concrete post will be required to secure the piping. It was agreed on the cemetery inspection prior to the meeting, that the notice board also requires replacing

ALL SAINTS CHURCH NEWS

In preparing for our weekly Wednesday 10.00am Holy Communion service at All Saints Husbands Bosworth, I read the following verse from the Bible. "I have loved you with an everlasting love; therefore I have continued my faithfulness to you." Jeremiah 31:3

I was struck once again by the powerful truth that you and I don't earn God's love. We couldn't earn it even if we tried.

Also, I noticed that it is a powerful reassurance to us that the love God has for us doesn't wax and wane according to our performance, our reciprocal love for God, our obedience to God's commands, etc..

Our love for God, or lack thereof, doesn't influence God's own free choice to love us, infinitely, and second by second!

Certainly, we are called to respond to God's love, to adopt God's values and priorities and that involves coming to hate sin and to do battle against its pernicious effects in our lives, our families, our workplaces, our communities, our nation.

But we must never believe the lie that the reality of our sin affects God's love for us! In Christ we are forgiven of our sin; we are declared to be righteous; we are an adopted child of the Lord God; we are the apple of His eye; we are loved with an everlasting love and we can count on the faithfulness of God being shown to us forevermore!

As we gather for Holy Communion, we pause at the start and we take a long hard look at ourselves. We notice, we own up to and we accept our failures. We come to God, we admit our failure, we look it in the eye and we ask for God's forgiveness.

Because of Jesus, his death and resurrection, we are promised that forgiveness is granted to us. We can then come into the presence of God Himself, clean, renewed, pure, ready to encounter Him in worship and Holy Communion.

The deepest fact of human existence is not our ability to mess things up, but God's ability to set things right. Holy Communion is a wonderful place of renewal, reconciliation, restoration. A place of hope and transformation. You are all invited...

WATER WATCH...

Hopefully this advice may be a bit late, but if the drought continues and readers are reminded to save cold water run off from hot tap to wash vegetables. You can then use the washing water to water plants....

PROPOSED NEW 'SUPER' JAIL AT GARTREE


