

BUS STOPS HERE?

Bus services across the county, including our own 58 Lutterworth to Market Harborough service are to be reviewed as part of Leicestershire County Council's reassessment of their subsidised public transport routes.

A recent Scrutiny Committee meeting heard that the authority subsidises 26 routes to the tune of over £3m per year, with individual subsidies varying from £40,000 to over £200,000, and called on the Council to review their viability, with a view to either reducing the frequency of services, re-routing services, seeking outside funding, moving to a demand-led service or cutting under-used services altogether.

The committee stressed that services providing access to medical or social facilities, where alternative means of transport would be problematic, would be considered more favourably.

Consultation with users and representatives of the operators is due to start soon, with the changes expected to come into force in August. Look out for your opportunity to help us save our service. Use it or lose it...



WATER MAIN

Villagers will be pleased to hear that work to replace the ageing water main along the A5199 Welford Road between Knaptoft and Arnesby has commenced and that the work, which has seen the road closed for 6 months, is due to be completed ahead of schedule. Meanwhile the road restrictions between the Bruntingthorpe crossroads and Arnesby, and restrictions from the Foston Road turn and Arnesby crossroads will remain in place to prevent traffic from using the surrounding villages to by-pass the closures.

The work, to replace almost 4 miles of underground pipe, part of a wider £3m project, which started in August, was due to be completed by the end of April but the contractors for Severn-Trent Water have confirmed that the work is ahead of schedule and is now likely to be completed by mid-March.

TOT TIME

HOW TO TELL A SCAM FROM A GENUINE MESSAGE?

Things to look out for...

- Unrecognised or withheld numbers
- Urgently needed decisions or deadlines for action
- Requests for payment, prepayment or payment details
- The origins of any links in message - 'hover' your computer mouse to check it out
- Be wary of poor English, and grammatical or spelling errors

A key indicator may be to ask yourself if the sender would have the contact details by which the message has been sent. Many 'spammers' blast out messages widely and blindly... For example banks or government departments don't usually hold your mobile phone details. Increasingly, scammers are turning to *WhatsApp* and *Facebook*, so query any unsolicited messages from these sources.

BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Mallard - *Anas platyrhynchos*

Mallards are dabbling ducks - feeding in shallow water by dabbling and upending. Due to genetic variability, their plumage is highly variable. Generally, males have dark green heads, yellow bills, purple-brown breasts, and grey bodies. Females have brown bills and mottled brown feathers. Both sexes also sport a blue flash, on their wings.

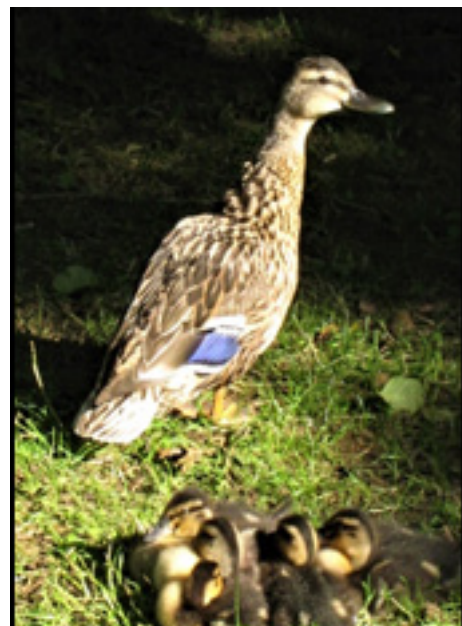
Mallards are found widely across the northern hemisphere and have been introduced to countries south of the equator. In the UK there are roughly 100,000 breeding pairs, which are joined by 400,000 migratory birds from Iceland and northern Europe in the winter.

They are omnivorous and feed on aquatic plants, larvae, and insects. On the other side of the coin, archaeological evidence shows that mallards have been on the human menu since Neolithic times. Even today it is open season for shooting from September to January; a factor which, together with the threat from natural predators, explains why they can sleep with one eye open.

They lay eight to thirteen eggs in the spring and incubation takes around 4 weeks. The ducklings are precocial [*from the same root as precocious*], meaning they are able to swim and feed almost immediately after hatching.

The quacks of females are louder and higher pitched than males, and both sexes quack louder in noisy environments and, after her ducklings hatch, a female mallard uses an abbreviated 'qua...', to summon her brood to join her.

Outside of the breeding season, they like to congregate in flocks. Bizarrely, the collective noun depends on where they are. On water they can be referred to as a 'raft' or 'paddling', on the ground a 'waddling' and a 'skein' in the air.

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

A recent trawl of the Society's Archive Collection came up with a scrapbook compiled by villager Albert Henley in the 1960s. Albert was a prolific photographer and amateur cine enthusiast and we have a large number of his photographs and a number of 8mm cine films that depict everyday life in Bosworth.

When we recently featured these two items from Albert's scrapbook on the Historical Society's Facebook page, Aneurin Owen reminded us that Albert was in charge of a gang of local Italian prisoners of war employed in manual tasks, cutting back and hedgelaying overgrown hedges. This work sheet details a work party carrying out work at Stonton Wyville, near Tur Langton in April 1945.

The work was overseen by the local War Agricultural Executive Committee (the WarAg), a government backed organisation tasked with improving the efficiency of agriculture and food production during the war.

Under the terms of the Geneva Convention it was permissible for prisoners of war to be employed in any activity as long as it wasn't classed as 'war work'; directly helping

the war effort. Carrying out manual tasks on farms was an ideal option, especially as many prisoners of war were from rural backgrounds.

The Italians were particularly suited to this outdoor work and the relative freedom, as they had no inclination whatsoever of escaping back to a war that they felt had been thrust unfairly upon them. Many soon became friends of the families where they were employed and gained many liberties, often borrowing shotguns or setting snares to provide a few rabbits for the camp cook pot.

This photograph, taken at the back of Foxbury in 1944, shows two Italian POWs with the Owen sisters, Janet Smith and Betty Twizzleton.

MORE BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

For our next meeting on Wednesday, March 1st, the Historical Society will be welcoming Matthew Beamish, lead archaeologist at the University of Leicester. Matthew will be updating us on recent work carried out at the site of the Neolithic causewayed enclosure, between Husbands Bosworth and Welford. Of national importance and designated as a Scheduled Ancient Monument, the site, which was discovered during geophysical and other preparatory work to open up land for quarrying in the 1980s, has been interpreted as a Stone Age meeting place and has yielded artefacts from the Neolithic period through into the early Bronze Age. **The meeting starts at 8.00pm at the Village Hall. Visitors are welcome - a door charge of £2.50 is requested.**

Teas, coffee and biscuits will be served afterwards.

BOSWORTH SKY AT NIGHT

Astronomy from your Backyard - the March sky

The constellation Gemini, the Twins, *Castor* and *Pollux*, is due south (towards Welford) at 9.00pm at the middle of the month. The star chart shows the brightest stars in Gemini as seen by the naked eye.

Castor is 51 light years away, white and more a star system than a single star as we see it. However, it is a fine double star for telescope observers, consisting of *Castor A* and *Castor B*. There is also a third star in the group, *Castor C*, which is a dim red dwarf and only seen with large professional telescopes. Amazingly each of the three stars is also a binary star in its own right, making the star Castor a system with six suns! Whilst our own solar system has the one star, our Sun, it is not unusual for other stars in the sky to be double or multiple stars, orbiting around each other. Imagine if we had two or more suns in the sky, how would that look? Meanwhile, Pollux is an evolved orange-hued giant star about 34 light years away.

□ The moon is full on March 7th, last quarter on 15th, new on 21st and first quarter on 29th. Binoculars give great views of the moon bringing the *maria* (seas) and larger craters to life at last and first quarter and the ray system at full moon.

□ The Vernal Equinox (equal day and night) is on March 20th.

□ Venus appears as a brilliant white 'evening star' in the western sky (towards North Kilworth). At the start of the month it is very near to a bright Jupiter - Venus being the brighter of the two.

□ In case you were wondering about the so called 'green comet' in February (Comet C/2022 E3 ZTF) it was observable as a small white fuzzy object in binoculars. If you didn't see it you didn't miss much!

Editor's Note: If you missed it, don't fret - it will be back in 50,000 years time...

ALL SAINTS CHURCH NEWS

Recently we have seen the creation of 'warm spaces' - designated places, opened to anyone, especially those struggling to afford to heat their homes, where they are welcome to just come and get warm.

On the one hand, I am ashamed that in our society such places are necessary. On the other hand, it inspires me that there are people out there who are willing to help the most vulnerable members of our society. I pray Gods blessing on them.

Reflecting on this, I was led to wonder what other societal needs exist? What other kinds of 'spaces' might be beneficial across the country? It struck me that one very real need is for 'slow spaces'. Our pace of life is often frenetic and frantic - we rush from one thing to the next, never feeling like we have enough time. Even in our downtime we are often double-screening, over-loading ourselves with information, sights and sounds.

As a Christian, I am always prompted to see if the Bible has any wisdom for us and I noticed that after a busy period of ministry, Jesus said to his disciples, "Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest." [Mark 6:31]

- 'Come with me...' - we need to make space and time simply to be with Jesus, to open ourselves to his presence, to rest in him and with him

- '...by yourselves' - large and unfamiliar groups are not conducive to restfulness

- '...to a quiet place' - it is hard to find peace in the hub-bub of normal life; you need to make an empty space for that to happen

- '...and get some rest' - we are not called to live a life of restfulness, but we need rest in order to be able to work well and in a healthy and sustainable way

The goal is a balanced life of work and rest. Something enshrined in God's pattern for us by the idea of Sabbath - a 24 hour period each week to simply rest. To do those things which restore, refresh, re-energise, and re-invigorate.

As I observe our society, it seems clear to me that people need 'slow spaces'. Spaces where the pace is taken down a notch, where the sound is switched off, screens are extinguished, where people can come into the presence of God, find healing for their bruised and battered souls. Places where people can find refreshment, inspiration, courage, and hope.

Fortunately, there is already a national network of these 'slow spaces'. In fact, almost no village or community is without one, we generally call them 'churches'...
