

YOUR VOTE COUNTED...

All the hard work by the Neighbourhood Plan group in gathering the vast amounts of supporting information and compiling the Neighbourhood Plan came to fruition with a resounding 'yes' vote in the recent referendum.

The 'made' Plan now becomes a statutory planning document that must, by law, be consulted by developers and planners and will steer the character and extent of future development within Husbands Bosworth parish into the next decade. The Plan can't stop development entirely, but it can be a powerful tool in modifying inappropriate facets and help to ensure that whatever does happen carries a community benefit. Furthermore, the Plan is dynamic, with a built-in facility for updating and refining as circumstances and needs within the community change.

A point to note is that Harborough district as a whole is over-subscribed within national government requirements for housing. Therefore, although Bosworth is classified as a Rural Centre and technically ripe for further development there is no pressure to accept anything that we don't want. We can now make a firm stance against many aspects of future development, firm in the knowledge that our arguments are backed up by the overwhelming community support for the adoption of the Neighbourhood Plan.

POLICE FILE



COVID RULES

From the 17th May 2021 COVID legislation was updated.

- Outdoor gatherings are limited to 30 persons
- Indoor gatherings are limited to 6 people, or 2 households
- Indoor entertainment and attractions such as cinemas, theatres, concert halls, bowling alleys, casinos, museums and indoor play areas can now open, subject to safe capacity restraints and COVID-secure measures in place
- Indoor and outdoor events, including live performances, sporting events and business events are allowed, but attendance will be subject to safe capacity constraints
- Indoor hospitality venues such as restaurants, pubs, bars and cafes are able to open.
- Organised indoor sport, including gyms, can resume but must be organised by a business, charity or public body and will be subject to safe capacity constraints and COVID-secure measures in place
- Holiday accommodation, including hotels and B&Bs, can now open, but is restricted to groups of up to 6, or 2 households
- Funeral attendance is limited to how many people the venue can safely accommodate with social distancing
- Limits at weddings, wakes and other religious and commemorative events are increased to 30 people

Note that Leicestershire Police will still be acting on any information received relating to apparent breaches of regulation.

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BOSWORTH IN FOCUS

AT HOME IN BOSWORTH

One of the side-effects of the Covid-19 pandemic has been a huge increase in the use of electronic signatures on all sorts of documents.

Electronic signing can cover a range of options from simply typing a name into the signature space on a contract in a Microsoft Word document, or sending an email confirming agreement, all the way up to a contract through to the use of a fully-fledged electronic signing platform.

Things like an agent's or solicitor's terms of business, a residential tenancy agreement of less than 3 years, and guarantor agreements under certain conditions are what is called 'simple contracts' and can be signed by any reasonable electronic method. This would include something as simple as acknowledgment and acceptance of the terms sent in a personal email.

If a deed is involved, or if it is a company signing a contract then things are more difficult. Electronic signatures can be used for deeds and company signatures but the current legal viewpoint is that the witness must be physically present with the person signing and not add their signature later.

Being a witness is pretty straightforward: it just needs to be someone independent (i.e. not a party to a contract, nor directly affected by it in any way). Family members are acceptable (if not affected by the contract) and an estate agent is an acceptable witness in many instances as well.

So, as you can see, electronic signatures are nothing to be afraid of and are now a permanent part of the property landscape.

P.S. If there are any landlords reading this you are now legally obliged to have carried out EICRs on all of your let properties. If you haven't done so then you'd better do it now!

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Pill-bug - *Armadillidium vulgare*

350 million years ago, a shrimp-like creature found food and safety at the water's edge.

Today you'll find its descendants hiding under stones and plant pots in your garden. If you didn't know their back-story, you might suspect that they are beings from another planet.

They share many characteristics with their marine cousins. For instance, they breathe using gills and dehydration leads to suffocation. They have blue blood which uses haemocyanin (copper), rather than haemoglobin (iron), to transport oxygen around their bodies.

Mother pill bugs carry their eggs in a pouch called a marsupium. Biologists call these toddlers

mancae, and these buglets stay with mum for a few days before venturing out on their own.

In common with other arthropods, they grow by moulting their exoskeleton. However, young pill-bugs shed the rear half of their carapace first, then their front. So, you might discover a two-tone, half pink and half grey, individual. Also, youngsters are born with twelve legs and don't have their full complement of fourteen until they complete their second moult.

Their lavatorial habits are noteworthy. How to put this delicately... They can drink from both their front and rear ends! They don't urinate, instead, they expel ammonia gas through their skins, and they consume their poop to recover the copper they need to survive.

They've adopted a nocturnal lifestyle and they're an environmental asset as detritivores who return nutrients to the soil by dining on decaying vegetation. They are also a food source for birds, toads, spiders, wasps, etc.

'Roly-polies', as they're also known, can roll into a ball when threatened and to prevent moisture loss in dry times, though those captured for the photograph were camera-shy and preferred to run away and hide. This ability goes by the marvellous word - "conglobation".

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

This month, as the weather warms up a bit, flock-masters across the country will be getting down to the task of shearing their charges. Here we have a wonderful view of this arduous but necessary stock task as it would have been carried out a hundred years ago. Back-breaking and invariably undertaken on a warm, dry day when the rise of lanolin in the fleece allowed for a smooth cut, this was always long, hot and tiring work - definitely a job for the 'young 'uns...' It must therefore have been a relief to be able to make the job into a bit of a social event.

Here we catch up with the Bromells, who farmed much of the land between Bosworth village and Sibbertoft Road before the aerodrome was built, and their cousins, the Westaways from Naseby. The chap on the left in particular seems to be having a whale of a time, whilst the 'lads' indulge in a spot of youthful high jinx and the 'boy' makes sure the scrumpy cider for teatime is still drinkable!

The Bromells land was requisitioned in 1942 and the family was forced to vacate the place. A sale on the premises conducted by E A Lane & Sons, on September 25th saw 76 head of cattle, 121 sheep and a bacon pig sold. The farmhouse and most of the buildings were uncerimoniously demolished to make way for the building of the aerodrome and Sibbertoft Road, which fronted the steading, was closed.

THE BOSWORTH GARDEN

Jobs for June

To have big healthy plants, make sure you give them plenty of water and food. There are plenty of choices from homemade nettle-comfrey liquid, to slow release chicken manure pellets or a general liquid feed.

There is much to do in the garden in June - here's a short list to get you started:

Flowers

Sow poppies directly where they are to flower as they dislike root disturbance.

Feed and keep picking sweet peas to keep them flowering. To remove pollen beetles, put the infested plants in a dark room with the window open and they will fly towards the light and out the window!

Thin out hardy annuals like cornflowers and nigella aiming for a 30cm gap. Fill gaps with bedding like geraniums, dianthus, marigolds and keep them well watered!

Sow next year's biennials - foxglove, lupin and wallflowers, etc. into pots,

Cut delphiniums, pulmonarias and oriental poppies back to the ground and feed.

Support tall or 'floppy' plants from summer winds with with ring supports, stakes or trellis.

Bulbs

Lift tulip bulbs to dry and store over winter.

Continue to plant gladioli for successional flowers

Plant autumn flowering crocus into lawns

Feed and stake dahlias, keep an eye out for earwigs!

Vegetables

Harvest early potatoes as soon as they begin to flower - use them fresh for the best flavour.

Sow squashes, pumpkins and courgettes - put two in and prick out the weaker one.

Continue to sow herbs, salads, radish, beetroot, carrots, beans and sugar-snap peas.

Water a pot and sow basil thinly; water every other day. Germination takes 10 days.

Water grow bags daily - tomatoes, beans and peppers especially need plenty. Feed them too!

Direct sow overwintering veg like brassicas and leeks.

Fruit

Thin gooseberries, pick out every other one to allow the remaining fruit to ripen.

Prune out congested fruit tree branches and reduce any clusters, allowing fruit to grow larger and reduce 'June Drop'!

Ripen strawberries in the greenhouse or under glass cloches if they need some help.

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CHURCH NEWS

All Saints Parish Church & St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church

FROM THE RECTORY

One of the things people have missed at church during this pandemic is the opportunity church usually affords to sing together as a congregation. It's not that we have been without music - we have listened to recorded music at our Benefice services, and also at weddings and funerals. But somehow it is not quite the same.

At funerals, listening rather than participating in the singing makes the occasion a more sombre affair - occasions which are naturally sad become more so. At weddings, which are often, by nature, a watching event as the couple make their vows and everyone else is witness, that watching is somehow enhanced. We are denied the opportunity to share in the celebration by participating in the hymns. In our church Sunday services we can read the words of the hymns we listen to, and may even mouth the words or hum the tunes behind our masks, but it is a different way of offering our praise and worship to God. Again we may feel we are more observers of a performance rather than participants in worship.

Since the end of March we have been allowed to sing together outside, but not inside, and many have welcomed the opportunity to sing a hymn together as we leave the church.

We know from various documentaries about choirs, and maybe from singing in them ourselves about the therapeutic benefits of singing together. It does our souls and our bodies good to sing together and make a joyful and sometimes beautiful noise. It can also strengthen bonds of friendship from a shared activity and we can come away from such singing uplifted in our spirits and ready to face whatever comes next - even if our voice isn't much on its own, when blended with other voices it doesn't matter.

Singing can take us to places we might not otherwise go, involving our emotions and our spirits, it can pick us up and take us on a journey and leave us in a different place. It is also one of the sounds we anticipate to hear in heaven. Certainly some of the biblical visionaries saw singing from the angels and the saints as one of the components in heaven.

John Donne, a 17th century priest, poet and preacher, and one time Dean of St Paul's Cathedral, in his prayer 'Our last awakening' spoke of heaven having 'no noise or silence, but one equal music'. So, we look forward to the day, hopefully soon, when restrictions are lifted and we can once again sing our praises to God together in church and render him the praise and honour, from our own hearts and with our own lips, that he is due. While we may one day join it, we don't want to wait for that heavenly choir.

So I'm looking forward to when we can raise the rafters with our song. Come and help us when we are allowed to. Hopefully soon...


