eamwork by groups associated with the facilities on the village playing field have come together to provide and install a new defibrillator at the Sports Pavilion.

In the unfortunate event that someone suffers a cardiac arrest there is approximately a three minute 'golden' window of opportunity in which to administer treatment that may aid recovery. Running to the existing defibrillator on the village green would be extremely difficult in the required time, which is what spurred on North Kilworth Football Club to look into providing a suitable facility nearer to the playing field.

Recent publicity surrounding the recovery of Danish football international, Christian Eriksen, who suffered cardiac arrest on the pitch during the Euro 2020 Competition, has sparked interest in a campaign for providing medical aid and resuscitation equipment at all sporting venues.

North Kilworth Football Club, which has hundreds of members, many from Husbands Bosworth, has carried out lots of improvement work on the sports field over the last two years, enhancing the facility for all users. At the end of season Junior Presentation and Fun Day, a number of parents and committee members decided to raise funds for an additional defibrillator that would benefit the village, and in particular those who use the playing field.

Club Treasurer, Debbie Brown and Under 10's Team Secretary, Joanne Cave, put in much effort organising donations and running a tombola, with all monies going directly towards the defibrillator fund. Ascough's Bistro in Market



Harborough, which is owned by Under 14's coach, Chris Ascough and his wife Abby, who are from the village and have four children who are members of the Club, generously matched the amount raised!

Industrial Laundry Equipment Ltd., owned by Club Chairman, Richard Brown and wife Debbie, agreed to fund the remaining balance, and with the permission of Husbands Bosworth Parish Council, Jaw Maintenance & Systems of Lutterworth, kindly installed the equipment at the Pavilion.



Whilst we all very much hope that the defibrillator is never needed, in the event that it is required then it would be wonderful to know that the teamwork of the sponsors, donors and groups was there to help!

#### **MEMORIAL FLIGHT**

Voventry Gliding Club, which operates from the former RAF Husbands Bosworth - aerodrome, is proposing to install a permanent memorial and interpretation material at the Gliding Centre to commemorate the courage and sacrifice of those who passed through the training units that were based there during the war. Many of the young men who trained to become bomber crew here went on to fly deadly bombing missions and tragically some of those brave young men won't have come back.



The Club is looking for memories of those who served and trained at the station and also memories of local people who shared their lives with this small 'town' of incomers. After the war the site was taken over by the National Assistance Board to accommodate Polish refugees and the Club is also keen to commemorate their contribution and the sacrifices that the Polish community made during and after the war.

Many folk with associations to the aerodrome during its operational life and the Polish Displaced Peoples Camp are still living locally, and Peter Hill, secretary to the Gliding Club is keen to put together a history of this chapter of the site's history.

# **POLICE FILE**



In recent weeks there has been a spate of thefts and attempted thefts of livestock vehicles in the north Northamptonshire and south Leicestershire areas

Crime Reduction Officers are advising of a number of measures livestock keepers can take to minimise the risk.

• Record trailer serial numbers and take photographs which can be useful in publicising the theft on social media platforms

• Put your postcode on the roof or an hidden area of the chassis of trailers and equipment

• Some insurers offer discounts on premiums where approved tracking or security marking systems are fitted

• If your equipment is security marked or tagged make sure that it is registered to you especially if you have bought the equipment second-hand

• Use a wheel clamp, hitch lock or ground anchor and consider installing security posts at entry points

• Remove trailer wheels and store off site if they're not going to be used for a while

• Reversing up closely to a solid object such as a wall and place other heavy items in front to make removal difficult

• Put up simple signs that warn that security measures have been installed

**REMEMBER:** In many cases simple measures making it difficult for the thief will usually encourage them to look for easier pickings!

Melton Area Beat Team are advising that they have noted a spate of car key cloning incidents recently, where thieves have been using scanning devices to 'copy' keyless entry car-key codes. The scanner copies the car's legitimate fob signal, 'tricking' the car into opening up, cancelling alarms and immobilisers and allowing the thief to start the vehicle and make off undetected.

Presently scanners need to be within the radio range of the fob - between 5 and 10 metres, so a criminal standing close to a house could detect a signal from a fob in a hallway or inside the front door. A simple deterrent would be to keep the fob as far away as possible from the vehicle and, for added protection, shield it in a proprietary radio-signal safe box.

# **BOSWORTH IN FOCUS**

#### WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

#### Common Toad - Bufo bufo

As March dawns, the thoughts of Millennium Wood toads turn to procreation and they begin their annual trek to the pond. Unlike frogs, they crawl, using their powerful shoulders and stumpy legs to inch across the ground, like miniature sumo wrestlers!

The aim of the male is to latch on to the back of a female in what is called the amplexus position. The pair then swim to a patch of pond weed where the female lays her eggs. Frequently other males will join the mating pair until there is a ball of toads! Sometimes so many latch on that, tragically, the female is overwhelmed and drowns.

Ten days after laying, the tadpoles hatch and two to three months later those who have survived leave the pond as tiny toadlets. Until the next breeding season, they spend the daylight hours hidden away in holes, emerging as night falls to feed on worms, insects and the larger individuals may even tackle a small mouse.

The bumps on their skin are not warts, but parotiod glands, which produce a neurotoxin.

Predators have learnt to avoid these poisonous individuals. But don't worry if you have to pick up a toad, perhaps to move it to a place of safety. Simply wash your hands afterwards. In terms of conservation, toads are doing well, though their numbers have decreased due to habitat loss and roads bisecting their migration routes.

Of course, in days of yore they were known as witches' familiars and are apparently an important ingredient in love potions. Regrettably, I've been unable to unearth the secret recipe - in all probability, it's restricted to accredited coven members...

Lastly, there are several collective nouns for toads, but my particular favourite is a squiggle of toads...

#### **BOSWORTH SKY AT NIGHT**

#### Astronomy from your Backyard

This month we look at the winter constellation, Gemini, The Twins (Castor and Pollux), which is due south (towards Welford) at 9.00pm at the middle of the month.



Our star chart shows the brightest stars in Gemini as seen by the naked eye. The star Castor (desig. *a Geminorum*), top left in the constellation, is 51 light years away, white to the naked eye and more a star system than a single star, as seen with the unaided eye. Telescope observers see a fine double star consisting of Castor A and Castor B. (There is also a third star in the group, Castor C, which is a dim red dwarf, only seen with large telescopes).

Amazingly, each of the three stars are also a binary stars in their own right, making Castor a system with six suns! Whilst our own solar system has one star, our Sun, it is not unusual for other stars to be multiple stars... Imagine if we had two or more suns in the sky, how would that look?

The star Pollux (desig.  $\beta$  *Geminorum*) at 7 o'clock to Castor, is an orange-hued evolved giant star about 34 light years away (the colour is evident with binoculars). Interestingly Pollux is brighter than Castor yet it is designated Beta not Alpha, maybe because observed brightness over the centuries of the six star Castor system has varied?

The moon is full on March 18<sup>th</sup> when binoculars will give great views, bringing the *maria* (seas) and larger craters to life and the ray system at full moon.

Keep an eye out for the planet Venus appearing as a brilliant white 'morning star' low down before dawn in the sky towards Sibbertoft. Although faint, you might also spot Mars at 4 o'clock and Saturn at 5 o'clock - a pre-dawn planetary conjunction. **Next month: Leo the Lion and a meteor shower!**

#### **BYGONE BOSWORTH** *Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection*

Many thanks to Melinda Sprason of Butt Lane for passing on this wonderful picture of the foundation stone laying ceremony for the Wesleyan Chapel on Welford Road.

Hilda Porter's memories in the Historical Society's *Bygone Bosworth No.1* gives us the background to the establishment of the chapel.

'On the piece of ground where the Wesleyan Methodist Church now stands stood an old thatched mud cottage owned by the Dawes family. When the cottage was demolished, the Dawes family, devout Methodists, gave the ground to the Methodist Society in the hope that a church would be built there one day.

Before the church was built, the Methodists met at 25 High Street, the home of the Superintendent of the Market Harborough Methodist Circuit, Rev. Bertrand Cooper, who lost his first wife and two children to diphtheria. His second wife lived next door at 27 High Street, now called Foxbury, and through this marriage the Methodists were given use of the little house next door; 29 High Street, where meetings

were held regularly. The new Wesleyan Methodist Church was built on the Dawes plot and the little house was no longer needed, but still retains the name 'Little Zion.'

# **MORE BOSWORTH IN FOCUS**

#### **BOSWORTH GARDENS**

Spring usually arrives around mid-March bringing warmer, longer days and plenty of time to look forward to the growing season ahead. It's time to prepare your soil, choose your seed packets and get outside!

#### **Vegetable Patch**

•Plant garlic, onion and shallot sets and early potatoes

•Undercover sowings include lettuce, tomatoes, salads, and cauliflowers

•Outdoor sowings include carrots, broad beans, peas, herbs, leeks, sprouts, radish, beetroot, cabbage, turnip and parsnip **Flowers** 

•Top dress containers and pots with fresh compost to promote new spring growth •Divide and/or plant bulbs-in-the-green, such as snowdrops and winter aconites

•Deadhead winter flowers, winter pansies can keep flowering through to summer if you look after them

•Start to divide clumps of perennials such as hostas, hellebores and primulas.

 $\cdot$ Set up sweet pea supports and sow where they are to flower.

•Sow perennials such as poppies, astrantia and geraniums.

•Top dress spring flowering alpines with horticultural grit to prevent stem rot.

#### Healthy soil means healthy plants

Preparing for the growing season ahead is easily achieved by weeding then adding organic matter into your beds. Organic matter improves the structure and fertility of the soil, replacing nutrients that have been exhausted from the previous season.

To improve the fertility of your garden choose a day when the soil is moist and aim to spread 2-3 inches of compost or well-rotted manure over the surface. Dig over the surface to combine, which adds oxygen and improves drainage. Work any seedbeds for direct sowing until they have a fine crumby appearance. Cover beds with polythene, cloches or fleece to warm them up for seeds to germinate faster.

that several months in a row with lots of properties coming up for sale would make it a buyer's market, but most sellers are also buyers, and both sellers and buyers tend to have the common goal of moving to a new home during the summer, as it's a lot more pleasant to pack and move your worldly goods in the warm and dry than it is in the cold and wet. The volume of new listings coming to the market for sale is up 11% in the last three weeks compared to the same time last year. *Rightmove* reports that - right now - around 75% of all properties are successfully finding a purchaser. This is compared to a historical average of about 50%. Also homes are finding buyers in an average of 39 days, compared to an

average of 59 days over the last five years, so the high number of properties coming to the

market is definitely not resulting in an oversupply situation. If you're a seller who's also going to be a buyer, it makes sense to put your home on the market - or better still have a sale agreed and have solicitors instructed - before you go looking at new properties to buy. Doing so puts you in a much better position to get an offer accepted than someone making an identical offer whose property has not yet even been marketed. For one, it shows you are not just a 'tyre kicker' (of which there are a surprising amount lurking in the housing market...) and it also means that you are, potentially at least, much closer to completion and less likely to be the party holding up the chain and frustrating the seller's plans. *mark.baldwin@exp.uk.com*


#### ALL SAINTS CHURCH NEWS
