## **HOUSE RULES**

t looks as if Harborough District Council planners have been peering over our hedges and into our gardens again... The authority has recently published its latest Strategic Housing and Economic Land Availability Assessment (SHELAA), which provides evidence on the potential supply of development land across the District.

The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) requires local planning authorities to carry out regular reviews of land availability within their administrative area. The assessment started with a 'Call for Sites' during the spring of 2021, which provided an opportunity for landowners, developers, agents and site promoters to submit sites that they considered to have potential for development within the next ten years.

In the assessment Husbands Bosworth is identified as a Key Centre, having a number of key community assets, including a shop, Post Office, doctors' surgery, pharmacy, places of worship and pub, and looked at four sites with a potential 'yield' of over 200 homes.

Since the assessment commenced, one site off Honeypot Lane has been approved for


the erection of 10 homes and is awaiting development. The other developments are: 

Land to the east of Welford Road, behind Townend Close, which was projected to accommodate 137 new homes

<sup>22</sup> Land to the west of Welford Road, beyond Trolley Close and extending southwards behind the allotments, 57 homes

<sup>2</sup> Husbands Bosworth School Playing Field, 11 homes, but which, happily, was assessed as only being potentially viable if other developments provided a new school!

It is important to note that SHELAA is not a



Additionally, the village's Neighbourhood Plan laid out the community's vision for development up to 2031, more than satisfying the village's allocation at that time by identifying the extension to Kemp Drive as our preferred expansion option.

#### What does the parish council do?



### **BOSWORTH IN FOCUS**

#### WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

#### Elder - Sambucus Nigra

Elder, also known as Elderberry or Black Elderberry, favours sunny locations and is an arboreal gem of our countryside. From March until August, they decorate the hedgerows with their floral displays. The snow-white *corymbs* (plates of flowers) are hermaphroditic and are pollinated by flies.

It may come as a surprise, but elder leaves, wood, roots and even the seeds are poisonous. Symptoms of elder poisoning include nausea, vomiting, and in extreme cases coma. Despite its toxicity, herbalists, including Nicholas Culpeper, attributed medicinal qualities to elder trees. It was touted as a cure for afflictions such as freckles, sores, bloodshot eyes and piles. It was also used as a hair dye and fly repellent, though not at the same time! It's suggested the name 'Elder' derives from the Anglo Saxon 'æld', meaning fire; the connection being that hollow elder stems were used to blow air into recalcitrant fires.

Elder uses endozoochory (dispersal via the digestive tracts of animals) as a strategy to distribute its seeds. To encourage this behaviour, it encapsulates the seeds in a nutritious, non-toxic layer, and it's the pulp of these fruits that foragers use to make elder cordial and wine. Cooking up cordial isn't difficult and simply involves extracting the juice, sieving out solid material, adding sugar and secondary flavours, such as lemon and ginger.



The Celtic calendar consisted of thirteen lunar months, each of which was assigned a name and the characteristics of a tree. The thirteenth and final month of the year, which begins in November, was designated as the Elder Moon. It signified both endings and beginnings, as it was both the end and start of a year.

Lastly, an elder planted close to a doorway allegedly deters the devil and witches from entering a house...



#### **BOSWORTH SKY AT NIGHT**

#### Astronomy from your Backyard Cassiopeia and the Andromeda Galaxy

Cassiopeia, a Queen in ancient Greek mythology, is a small but distinctive constellation located directly overhead in the late autumn sky, in the middle of the northern Milky Way. Five bright stars mark out the characteristic, slightly irregular, W of this constellation making it easy to find in the night sky [see the diagram, right].

With good eyesight it is just



possible to spot the nearby M31 Andromeda galaxy as a faint fuzzy patch with the naked eye, shown as an oval ring in the diagram. With binoculars you will see it as a definite nebulous oval shape. M31 is the designation French astronomer, Charles Messier, gave to Andromeda in his 1774 listing. This galaxy is the farthest object that the unaided eye can see - in fact it is so far away that the light takes  $2\frac{1}{2}$  million years to reach us, so we are seeing the galaxy as it was  $2\frac{1}{2}$  million years ago! It is a sister galaxy to our own Milky Way and both are expected to collide in around 4 to 5 billion years, merging to form a giant galaxy. What a sight that would be, if we were around to see it!

### SCHOOL REPORT

HUSBANDS BOSWORTH C. of E. PRIMARY SCHOOL Head Teacher Alan Eathorne

Husbands Bosworth CE Primary School has recently launched our new initiative, 'Farm School', thanks to the help of the Leicestershire Young Farmers.

The school, which is part of the *Learn Academies Trust*, welcomed the Chair of Leicestershire Young Farmers, Greg Parkes, along with two of his colleagues, farmers Matt Kirk and Jess Armitage, to talk to the children and help explain the role farming plays in today's society and how important it is.

The trio showed the children their mobile milk van, which serves fresh, pasteurised milk direct from the farm. They were then invited to see a tractor and sit in the driving seat while Matt explained how farms use different machinery and why. The children also learnt about a 'day in the life' of a dairy farmer, as well as the different jobs associated with harvest time. Head teacher, Alan Eathorne said, "Our village is named after, and exists, because of farming and we want to celebrate our history by bringing farming back into our curriculum, but we also want our children to know how farming is shaping our future, is at the cutting edge of technology and is vitally important to our health and economic stability. When we asked our parents if they wanted the school to be known as one that 'supports nature, the countryside and farming' they all said yes - so making the decision to weave farming into our school was easy.

One of our overriding ambitions is to break down the stereotypes that exist and to allow children to see careers like farming as relevant to them, just as working in IT or being a teacher is. While many of our neighbouring schools have developed forest school as a thread in their teaching, we wanted to reflect our roots by bringing in agriculture where we could. We have many school families who are farmers and we're really looking forward to working

with them, alongside our own School Council members from Years 5 and 6, as we develop our Farm School over the months and years." Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

Lutterworth's new museum has officially opened its doors to the public with the aim of bringing to life the last 2,000 years, Roman times to the present day...

Lutterworth and District Museum now has a new base at Lutterworth Town Estates' High Point building, next to The Shambles pub, Market Street, Lutterworth.

The museum holds fascinating artefacts, documentation, photographs and memorabilia that chart the history of Lutterworth and its surrounding network of villages. There are displays about John Wycliffe who completed the first translation of the Bible from Latin into English in 1383, the world's leading collection relating to aviation pioneer Sir Frank Whittle who developed the jet engine in Lutterworth and a Rolls Royce Merlin engine recovered from a Hawker Hurricane fighter that was shot down during the Battle of Britain in 1940.

The museum is managed by Trustees, and staffed and run entirely

### **CHURCH NEWS**

All Saints Parish Church & St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church

#### **ALL SAINTS CHURCH NEWS**

I've been thinking about the experience of attending church and it struck me that we often fail to understand what we come to church for.

We don't come to church to pray - although we do always pray. We don't come to sing hymns - although we often do sing. We don't come to listen to scripture - although again, that is always a feature of our gathering. We don't come to hear a finely crafted, interesting and erudite sermon - which is just as well, as it rarely happens!

No, having scripture explained and applied is very often a key part of our gathered activity, but it is not the goal. We don't even come to church to receive holy communion - although that certainly takes a central place.

The real goal, the ultimate goal of coming to church is that we might meet with the risen Jesus. That is the core business of the church - to create spaces where people can meet with the risen Jesus and be transformed by that encounter.

That encounter happens in prayer, in worship, in hearing scripture and having it explained and applied, in receiving the sacrament of Holy Communion - and it is that encounter that is the goal, not the activity in and of itself.

The church's core business is not even the maintenance of our religious buildings - as wonderful and inspiring as they are, with their 1,000-year history. For the first three centuries there were no church buildings, so buildings cannot be our core business. In the future, we are going to have a lot fewer buildings, as we cannot find people willing to pay for their upkeep, or willing to work to keep them open.

Neither is the church's core business bound up with paid clergy. In the early church few church leaders were paid, yet the church grew faster at that time. So, paid clergy aren't essential to the core business of the church. Again, in the future we will certainly have fewer people like me because we simply can't afford them.

But the core business of the church will go on, as small communities of Christians find ways of helping their friends and neighbours to meet with the risen Jesus and to be transformed by that encounter.

So, I'm not frightened by the graphs that show the Church of England becoming extinct by 2060. The core business of the church is not structures, staff, buildings, or religious services - as good and as wonderful as all of those have sometimes been. The core business of the church is small communities that help others to meet with the risen Jesus and that transformation. That is the business that I want to be involved in...
