MORAL FIBRE

he eagle-eyed villager may have noticed an unsettling rash of strange road and pavement markings, which have appeared around the village in recent weeks. Rather than being sinister Masonic cyphers these markings are the vanguard of a campaign to bring ultrafast internet to the village.



The scheme, promoted by Gigaclear (and a man in a florid orange space suit...), is chiefly funded by private finance through a European venture capital fund but is also supported by local authorities and the UK government's Broadband Delivery UK programme (BDUK).

Where possible the installation will utilise existing infrastructure, underground ducting and poles, which is where our Masonic signage comes from. Engineers have been around the village, assessing available space in the existing underground telephone service ducting and removing redundant cabling to create space for the new technology.

The service will bring Ultrafast Full Fibre broadband, Fibre to the Home (FTTH), or Fibre to the Premise (FTTP), promising speeds of up to 1 gigabite. The service will utilise an unbroken fibre connection all the way from the exchange directly to properties, removing the bottle-neck speed restrictions that the existing part fibre/part copper wiring presents.

The roll-out in Bosworth, North Kilworth and South Kilworth is progressing at a pace, so look out for a man in an orange space suit promising warp-speed Broadband connection, threading cables into manholes in the near future...

MOVING BOSWORTH

he Boundary Commission for England (BCE) has published its final proposals for revisions to parliamentary boundaries. Under initial proposals Harborough would have become a parliamentary constituency with a boundary the same as that of the district.



However, following public consultation and the aim to 'level up' constituencies, the BCE has revised its proposals and now proposes to keep Harborough's existing split between three different parliamentary constituencies, but move some parishes, including Husbands Bosworth from Harborough Constituency to South Leicestershire Constituency.


toy. Free activity for children.

Action Fraud and the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) are urging consumers to take these steps to ensure you are more protected during the Christmas shopping period.

- Protect your accounts: Set up 2-step verification, which will independently authenticate your payment with a code sent to you by email or SMS.
- Check before you buy: Research online retailers to check they are legitimate. Read feedback from people or organisations that you trust, such as consumer websites.
- Pay securely: Use a credit card if possible when shopping online. Most major credit card providers protect online purchases and are obliged to refund you in certain circumstances. Using a credit card (rather than a debit card) also means that if your payment details are stolen, your main bank account won't be directly affected. Also consider using a payment platform, such as PayPal, Google or Apple Pay.

Whenever you pay online: Look for the closed padlock in the web address bar - it means your connection is secure.

Report suspicious activity: If you've received an email you're not sure about, forward it to the Suspicious Email Reporting Service (SERS) at: report@phishing.gov.uk. Suspicious text message? Forward it to 7726 (free of charge).

If you think you've been a victim of fraud, contact your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud online at actionfraud.police.uk or call: 0300 123 2040. More information on the Cyber Aware campaign and online shopping safety can be found on the NCSC website.

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Jackdaw Corvus monedula

Jackdaws used to visit our property, but recently they have been conspicuously absent. The British Trust for Ornithology estimates numbers at a healthy 1.4 m. pairs, and as they inhabit both rural and urban environments, I am hopeful ours are out finding food in the countryside! Their grey heads and necks, striking white irises and the fact they are the smallest British *corvid* make them easy to identify. They are inquisitive characters and great problem solvers. The one in the photo worked out how to balance on my feeder and get a snack of lard balls... They are social creatures, roosting and feeding together in a flock. Known by the collective noun of a 'clattering',



they can often be seen foraging in the fields, there is a definite pecking order within the group. A female that pairs with a higher-ranking male automatically rises to his level in the hierarchy. Another curious feature of their mating habits is that about 10% of the time jackdaws form homosexual bonds.

In antiquity, they were known as 'daws'. The prefix 'jack', meaning small, was added in the 16th century. The Latin designation '*monedula*' comes from their magpie-like fondness for shiny things - *monedula* being Latin for coins.

A study found that their diet consists of 40% insects, 30% animal and 30% vegetable matter. High on the menu are earthworms, woodlice, spiders, mice, slugs and snails and, rarely, young birds. Add a side order of cereals, potatoes, poultry and game food...

An ancient Greek saying, 'Swans will sing when the jackdaws are silent', is interpreted as meaning that the wise will speak when the foolish shut up - a bit unfair as jackdaws are some of the brightest birds.

BOSWORTH SKY AT NIGHT

Mars, the Geminid meteor shower and Venus/Mercury

For early risers the red planet, Mars, is blocked out by the Full Moon from 4.54am to 5.56am on the morning of December 8th. With the moon full and bright, it may be a little hard to see Mars, but a pair of binoculars will make this example of celestial mechanics easier to observe.

The annual *Geminid* shooting-star spectacular can be viewed in the eastern sky and peaks in intensity on the night of December 14th/15th, when up to 70 meteors



per hour are predicted. Best to watch before 10.00pm, when the moon rises and floods the sky with moonlight, making the meteors harder to see.

At the end of the month Venus and Mercury are close together, low in the south-western sky, soon after sunset. They are closest on December 29th, as shown in the picture. Venus will appear like a dazzling bright star, whilst Mercury will be less bright and a little difficult to see - persevere and you will spot it!

SCHOOL REPORT

HUSBANDS BOSWORTH C. of E. PRIMARY SCHOOL Head Teacher Alan Eathorne

A month in the life of Husbands Bosworth Primary School

Between 1939 and 1945 Britain was at war with Nazi Germany and its allies - a period of history our older children have been studying closely all term. As part of their topic, Class 4 got to travel back in time to experience what life was really like during the Blitz. In command on the day was our ARP Warden, Danny, who with his collection of war memorabilia including actual gas masks, newspaper cuttings, old money, kitchen items and stretchers, helped the children to get a real sense of the times and its dangers. They role-played being casualties and how to administer war time first aid, they pumped water across the playground putting out 'blitz fires', used home-made equipment (from brooms and shovels) to move and dispose of 'war time bombs' and learnt all about the role the Air Raid Precautions (ARP) Warden played in keeping Britain safe. It was an absolutely brilliant day. However it wasn't the only one...



Earlier in the month the children in Class 3 topped off their topic on the Stone Age with a

visit from the two archaeologists who were part of Leicestershire Fieldworkers and the Leicestershire Ancient Archaeological Community. Together they dug and scraped a test pit, discovering charcoal, flint, a piece of modern pottery and most excitingly, a piece of clay pipe dating back to the 1800s. As two boys exclaimed, "This is better than break time!" - high praise indeed!

Meanwhile our Reception children, accompanied by our older pupils, visited our friends at Dairy Farm Day Nursery to see the farm in action. They saw the cows and milking machinery, heard from Farmer Martin about the processes involved in producing a pint of milk, and then headed to the calving sheds to see the newborn additions. They squelched through mud, held their noses at the farmyard smells but smiled all morning as they experienced first-hand what it is like to be on a farm - all part of our new Farm School ethos.

Finally, and possibly most poignantly they marked Remembrance Day with a visit from the village's own Royal British Legion standard bearer, Mr Clarke, plus Parish Councillor, Major Bolter and a parent at our school, Major Jones. Their accounts of being in the armed services, the sacrifices made, plus what it means to remember, enabled the children to fully understand the role their village and community have played in keeping our country safe.

We believe in bringing learning to life for our children - and according to them, we definitely have this month! For more information on applying for a place at Husbands Bosworth Primary School please call 880212


BYGONE BOSWORTH

By this stage in the war, with little threat from the enemy, there was no need for the official censor to hide the station's full complement of Wellington bombers sitting on their dispersal areas, with his marker pen.

ALL SAINTS CHURCH NEWS

The Spirituality of Sitting Down

"Everyone will sit under their own vine and under their own fig tree, and no one will make them afraid, for the Lord Almighty has spoken." (Micah 4:4)

The heart of the Christian faith is the hope of heaven. We believe that Jesus died on the cross for our sins and then rose victorious from the grave to prove that death is defeated for all who put their faith in Christ. So, we live in the hope of heaven.

But when we think of that glorious, future state, how do we imagine it? What will heaven be like? Well, in the reading from Micah we see it poetically expressed as something completely ordinary. The future glorious state of humankind is expressed by the simple picture of someone sitting in their garden, in the pleasant shade of their own vine or fig tree, completely at rest and at peace, with nothing to disturb or frighten them. Which is both beautiful and profound.

It means that the simple act of sitting at rest and at peace can be an anticipation of the coming of the Kingdom of God. As we sit quietly and at rest, enjoying the simple pleasure of 'being', we can experience that as a foreshadowing of something that will happen when Christ's rule and reign is fully established at the end of time.

Just sitting quietly at rest can be a prophetic sign pointing towards the future glorious state when harmony and peace are fully established under Christ, the King of the Universe.

Which is a powerful reminder that our current experience of evil, wickedness, oppression, injustice, cruelty are shown up for what they are - a temporary aberration, a momentary madness, a passing storm...

The Prince of Peace has conquered the prince of this world. He has demonstrated his total victory by rising from the dead, defeating death, opening up the possibility of life, true life, eternal life, to all who will receive it.

So, every time we do something as simple as sitting down, at rest, and at peace, we can do that as an anticipation of the coming restoration and renewal of all things. Suddenly, something as commonplace and mundane as sitting down and taking our ease, takes on a whole new mystical and prophetic dimension - this is 'the spirituality of sitting down'
