### POSTE RESTANTE...

he Standard 1st Class postage rate (up to 100g.) is going up from 96p to £1.10 from April 3rd. Second Class will rise from

68p to 75p. Large letter rates (100g. - 250g.) will increase to £1.45 and £1.05.

barcoded stamps that you have by the end of July.

### **DOMESDAY BUTTON**

lthough, at first glance, it may seem like an April Fool trick, the Emergency Alert Scheme is far from a joke...

The government has recently been trialling an alert system to warn people, through the mobile phone network, of life-threatening situations such as severe weather events, such as flash flooding.

Although the government are keen not to emphasise the potential of the scheme, it is



not such a great stretch of the imagination to suggest that the alerts could also be used to warn of threats to national security, such as terrorist alerts...

Emergency Alerts will be locally targeted to the areas directly affected and will appear as a visual notification warning on your device and a loud siren-like sound for up to 10 seconds. The visual warning will be accompanied by device vibration to raise awareness notification of the hazard or threat.

It will appear on your device's home screen and you must acknowledge it before you can use other features. In a real situation an alert may include telephone numbers or website links containing further information.

The system will be rolled our nationally with a 'practice' alert on St. George's Day, April 23rd.

Welcome to the National Gardens Scheme 2023 season... The fabulous spring garden with hosts of daffodils at Stoke Albany House, Stoke Albany, LE16 8PT opens to the public on Sunday, April 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2.00pm to 5.00pm. This is a mature 4 acre country house garden which has been carefully and loving developed by the owner for over 40 years. All around the garden there are swathes of different types of daffodil flowering for weeks on end. Planted in among the daffodils are spring flowering shrubs. There are also many beautiful Japanese flowering cherry trees, including a group of Yoshino cherry trees creating clouds of spring blossom. The garden also features spring flowering Magnolias and silver birch trees with their attractive ghostly white trunks. This is a fantastic spring garden to visit and has been featured in the March edition of *The English Garden* magazine and it's here on our doorstep to explore!

On Sunday, April 30th Westbrooke House, Little Bowden LE16 8AX opens from 10.00am to 4.30pm. Westbrook is a late Victorian house surrounded by 6 acres of garden with lots of different features including a walled flower garden, walled kitchen garden, fernery, lower garden, wildlife pond, spring garden, lawns, woodland paths and a meadow with a wildflower area, ha-ha and hornbeam avenue. In late April the outstanding feature is the tulip display with over 10,000 bulbs for a brilliant display of colour.

# **POLICE FILE**



To contact your Dedicated Neighbourhood Team (DNT) online, use the quick and simple online contact tool - Search Lutterworth Police. You will be asked a few questions to make sure your query gets to the right place.

A campaign, organised by the Harborough District Community Safety Partnership, aims to raise awareness of the potential dangers to farm animals if dog owners do not keep pets under control at all times.

At this time of year the focus is often on sheep worrying - the legal term for a dog being loose, and chasing animals in a way which may cause injury or suffering. It is a criminal offence which carries a fine of up to £1,000 and, under the law, a farmer has the right to shoot a dog which is worrying livestock and cannot be controlled.

As well as livestock worrying, dog fouling can present dangers to farm animals and wildlife Do not let your dog foul in fields and don't leave poo bags on the ground or tied to fences

- Dog owners MUST bag and bin their dog's poo it carries a parasite called neospora which causes abortions in farm animals
- Bags left on the ground can be eaten by farm animals and cause them slow, painful deaths, or they can be baled up with silage and consumed that way

# **BOSWORTH IN FOCUS**

#### WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

#### Lesser Celandine - Ficaria Verna

Lesser Celandine is a member of the buttercup (*Ranunculaceae*) family of plants. It is an abundant wildflower which populates our green spaces and Millennium Wood. The photo shows them growing in the All Saints' Churchyard.

The celandine year starts in late winter/early spring, when they awake to take advantage of the sunlight reaching the forest floor. After recharging with solar energy, they bloom in March, coincidently, providing a timely nectar source for insects emerging from hibernation including queen bumblebees.

They continue to flower through to May, reacting to light by opening at dawn and closing at dusk - known to biologists as *heliotropism*. As May draws to a close, the foliage dies back and the plants enter a six-month dormancy phase, resting until the yearly cycle begins again. Typically, they spread vegetatively, not by seed dispersion. Underground, the plants produce large numbers of basal tubers, which are spread by animal or human digging, and also by flooding and natural erosion.

At a glance, celandines may be confused with winter aconites, but their leaves are heart-shaped, as opposed to the aconites narrow leaves, divided into finger-shaped lobes.

Lesser Celandines are poisonous and should never be eaten. Ingested raw they can lead to serious liver damage. Indeed, they can be lethal when eaten by livestock. Even touching the raw plant can cause contact dermatitis.

Before the advent of modern medicine, herbalists often used a principle known as 'The doctrine of signatures'. This principle decreed a herbal remedy would be more efficacious if the plant resembled the body part it was treating. For example, walnuts were used to treat deceases of the brain. Plainly, the question of why celandines were christened 'pilewort', is answered by the similarity of their root nodules to haemorrhoids! *Mike Chanter* 



#### **BOSWORTH SKY AT NIGHT**

#### Astronomy from your Backyard

This month we look at the spring constellation, Leo, the Lion, which is due south (towards Welford) at approximately 9.00pm. Leo is a constellation that looks vaguely like the mythical object it depicts, a lion leaping from left to right. Our star chart shows the brightest stars in Leo as seen by the naked eye. The brightest star in Leo is *Regulus* - one of the brightest stars in the night sky. It is 78 light years away, white to the naked eye and like Castor in Gemini from last month, more a star system than a single star as we see it with the naked eye, being a fine double star consisting of very bright *Regulus A* and faint *Regulus B*. Both stars, However, Regulus A and B, are binary stars in their own right, making the 'star' Regulus a system with four suns! Best view of the stars will be in the second half of April as the Moon is full in the first week (6th) and its brightness washes out a dark sky.

There are also celestial fireworks this month in the form of the annual Lyrid

meteor shower, which will peak on the night of  $22^{nd}/23^{rd}$  April but is visible 5 days either side of the peak - look towards the north-east (towards Gumley/Foxton). The Lyrids are rated a medium strength meteor shower and can usually produce approximately 12-15 shooting stars an hour at its peak. Meteors, or shooting stars, are when small particles given off by comets or asteroids hit our atmosphere at enormous speed and burn up. The Lyrids happen once every year when the earth crosses the path of the debris left by long period comet C/1861 G1 Thatcher in its orbit around the Sun. It is the oldest recorded meteor shower still visible today and was first recorded in c.687 BC.

Finally, Venus is a dazzling evening star in the west as the sun drops below the horizon. On 23<sup>rd</sup> April a young crescent moon lies just above Venus - what a sight this is in the darkening evening twilight!

### SCHOOL REPORT

HUSBANDS BOSWORTH C. of E. PRIMARY SCHOOL Head Teacher Alan Eathorne

Tree-mendous Party at Bosworth School Despite the cold and occasional hail storm, Husbands Bosworth CE Primary School held its first ever Tree Party on Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> March as part of its 'Farm School' activities. The afternoon saw grandparents and parents joining their children to plant the school's first ever orchard, comprising apple trees, alongwith 30 wild cherry trees and rowan and silver birch whips, donated by the Woodland Trust.

Speaking of the event, Headteacher, Alan Eathorne said, "The school has long had a desire to create a small orchard to help further our commitment to the environment, as well as support our farming linked learning. Thanks to a donation from Leicestershire County Council's Arboreal team, we are well on our way now. On the day each class



planted an old Leicestershire variety apple tree, with one also planted for our local preschool, Dairy Farm Day Nursery, before adding in the wild cherry, rowan and silver birch whips. "As the trees grow, our hope is that the children will deepen their knowledge of the seasons and how fruit is produced, learn about our county's fruit producing heritage, and when the trees are more established, we'll demonstrate how to press apples to produce delicious juice." The Tree Party also saw the families sow over 100 sunflower seeds, and the children in each class signing their tree stake for prosperity.

Husbands Bosworth CE Primary School is the first in the region to become known as a 'Farm School', whereby it weaves farming links into its lessons and activities, reflecting the village's heritage and links to local farming families.

#### ALL SAINTS CHURCH NEWS

Dennis the Small or Dionysius Exiguus (L. 'Dionysius the Humble') c. 470 - c. 544

Dionysius was a 6<sup>th</sup> century mathematician, astronomer, monastic theologian and canonist, considered to be the founder of the Christian calendar. His feast day is September 1<sup>st</sup>.

Dionysius was born in Scythia Minor, an area now shared by Romania and Bulgaria, and became a monk at a community of Scythian monks in Tomis, now Constanta, moving to Rome in about 500AD.

Credited with the translation of many ecclesiastical canons and decrees from Greek into Latin, Dionysius is best known for his work with the Christian calendar, particularly, as the inventor of the *Anno Domini* era, which reckoned the years from the birth of Christ.

This reckoning, and Dionysius' computation for the dates on which the Easter festival should be celebrated, was widely adopted.

#### CHARITY AWARDS LONG TERM INTEREST-FREE LOANS
