From Linny Beaumont, East Midlands Regional Director, Canal & River Trust

In light of the pressures faced by the canal network, Canal & River Trust (CRT) has made the decision to remove many of our towpath bins in order to prioritise funds for vital canal repairs. The Trust currently spends around £½million a year emptying bins - money that is needed to help look after and keep open the canals.

Whilst refuse facilities for boaters' waste will remain, unfortunately the dog waste bin at Welford Wharf Sanitary Station, which is emptied weekly at a cost of about £170 per year, will be removed from the end of June. We will be asking people who benefit from visiting the local canal to follow the Countryside Code by taking their waste back home with them.

We will be continuing our Plastics Challenge campaign, which encourages responsible use of the waterways and towpath clean-ups with the support of our volunteers and the wider community.

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Dog Rose *Rosa Canina*

The name Dog Rose comes from the early belief that the root was a cure for rabies. Those of us who have encountered this shrub will be well acquainted with its hook-shaped barbs. These aid the plant in its quest to reach the sunlight by clambering over competing vegetation, sometimes reaching heights of four or even five metres. Its attractive pink/white flowers prettify hedgerows and woodland margins in June and July, providing a valuable nectar source. The blooms are pleasant smelling with five petals and a large array of stamens. If you are looking for a sweet treat while out and about, the petals are edible and have a faint Turkish Delight flavour. Birds such as blackbirds, redwings and waxwings and small mammals also include rose hips as part of their autumnal diet.

Later in the year you might spot a curious ball of red threads attached to a stalk. This is a 'robin's pincushion' and it grows into a nest for the larvae of the *dipoloepis rosae* gall wasp.

The hips, which hold numerous hairy seeds ripen about this time. The bright red flesh is a valuable source of vitamins C, A, D and E, and historically it has been used to ward off and cure scurvy. Additionally, they contain an anti-inflammatory which relieves the symptoms of arthritis. Archaeologists have even discovered that our ancestors were eating them over 4,000 years ago! Many of us will remember our mothers treating coughs and colds with the pleasant-tasting rosehip syrup. During the World War II groups like the Scouts, Girl Guides, schools and the W.I. were encouraged to gather hips, harvesting hundreds of tons a year to be processed into syrup. Lastly, it is held that fairies eat hips as an aid to being invisible, which you have to admit is indisputably effective...

BOSWORTH SKY AT NIGHT

The night sky never really gets dark in June although bright objects can still be seen - Venus and reddish Mars, with a thin crescent Moon near them on the 21st and 22nd.

This month the Sun reaches its highest in the sky. Known as the Summer Solstice this occurs at 3.57pm on the afternoon of June 21st. The Summer Solstice has always been a mysterious event for human beings over millennia. It is thought Stonehenge and many other enigmatic archaeological monuments may have been constructed to align with the rising sun on Midsummer Day and even today rituals are held to celebrate this event. The earliest sunrise of the year will be at 4.48am on the morning of June 17th and the latest sunset at 9.40pm on the evening of June 25th, with twilight lasting nearly until 11.00pm. Double summer time during WWII and in an experimental period 1968 - 1971, gave an extra hour of daylight when it didn't get dark until around midnight at mid-summer.

On a clear evening, and if conditions in the atmosphere are right, silvery-blue Noctilucent Clouds (NLCs) can be seen in the twilight sky between 1½ and 2 hours after sunset and a similar time before sunrise. For the middle of June sunset is 9.30pm so look for them after 11.00pm and around 3.00am in the morning as sunrise is 4.40am. NLCs are not astronomical objects out in space but high altitude ice clouds up in the atmosphere, basically thin sheets of tiny ice particles at an altitude of between 60 and 80km. At this height NLCs reflect sunlight when the Sun is below the horizon. The picture shows bright noctilucent clouds over the rooftops of Husbands Bosworth early in the morning on 28 June 2022. The dark clouds are normal clouds much lower down in the atmosphere.

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

The last burials in All Saints churchyard were carried out in 1912, although a space has been reserved for a memorial garden and the burial of ashes. In 2005 the management of the graveyard was transferred to Harborough District Council, which became responsible for grass cutting, tree works, weed control, pathways, gates and wall maintenance.

The cemetery on Welford Road, on the other hand, is administered completely independently, under the control of Husbands Bosworth Parish Council, which has a statutory duty as the Burial Authority. Maintenance of the site, including grass mowing, hedge trimming and care of the remains of the Chapel of Rest is paid for out of Parish Council funds.

A recent family history enquiry received by the Historical Society entailed a consultation of the Burial Board ledger, which has been in use since the cemetery first opened for

business in 1859. There is a legal requirement for a record of all burials to be made and, in continuous use, our trusty tome has sadly suffered badly during its 164 years of continuous use.

Although a casual glance over the uneven greensward of the site today would seem to indicate that there are plenty of grave-spaces remaining to fill, in actual fact the Burial Book (and associated Cemetery Plan) record the interment of over 1,300 souls, with almost no empty spaces within the original walled area. In 1941 an acre of land at the rear of the site was purchased from the adjoining landowners, Leicestershire County Council, to provide additional spaces.

Editor's Note: At the current rate of community attrition the enlarged cemetery is projected to be able to accommodate more than 60 further years of burials.

FESTIVAL OF ARCHAEOLOGY

The month of July sees the welcome return of the Leicestershire and Rutland Festival of Archaeology. Running from Saturday, July 1st to Sunday 30th, the Festival is a series of events, including talks, heritage walks, demonstrations and re-enactments across the two counties.

Local guided walks include Hallaton Castle, Ingarsby deserted Medieval village, the 'shrunken' village of Stonton Wyville and the Burrough Hill Iron Age settlement site. Lutterworth Museum will be hosting Stone Age flint knapping demonstrations, there will be special guided tours of the Wigston Framework Knitters' Museum and Hallaton Museum will be open, as usual on Saturdays and Sundays 2.30pm - 5.00pm.

Closer to home, Lutterworth Fieldworking and Archaeological Group will be undertaking test-pit excavations in Lutterworth town. The Lutterworth group and Great Bowden Heritage Group have also produced downloadable self-guided heritage walks.

Many events during the Festival are free, but there is a small charge for some events - children are usually free, so the Festival events are a great way to introduce youngsters to the past!

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Our Winter Programme for the 2023-4 season is now taking shape... We will be resuming meetings on Wednesday, October 4th, when Stephen Evans of the *Friends of the Great Central Main Line* will be outlining the progress that has been made in the project to reconnect the preserved heritage line from Birstall to Loughborough with the line from Loughborough to Ruddington, on the outskirts of Nottingham.

Also lined up is a detailed look at the recently discovered Rutland Roman mosaic and villa site at Ketton and the on-going project to rejoin the Ashby Canal to its original terminus at Moira.

In some ways, closer to home, we look at local business, Languard's part in the decontamination of Gruinard, the anthrax island off the coast of Scotland, in 1985.

Meanwhile, our Summer Outing will be on Wednesday, June 14th when we will be going to Stonehurst Family Farm and Museum, Mountsorrel. WELFORD ACTION GROUP

The Welford Action Group (WAG), which campaigns on traffic issues relating to Welford and the A5199 corridor, has recently contested a renewed planning application for the Portly Ford site adjacent to the A5199/A14 junction.

Despite opposition from WAG, planning permission was granted recently for the development of the former quarry site to the south of the junction, which will see a petrol filling station, Drive-thru fast-food and coffee stop and hot food restaurant built, with a total of 150 car parking and 78 HGV parking spaces.

A further application has now been put before Northants West planners, which proposes the erection of three B8 storage units, of 90,000sq. ft., 178,500sq. ft. and 50,000sq. ft.

WAG are opposing this latest development on the basis of the likely increase in HGV traffic travelling to and from the site along the A5199, especially at times of motorway closures.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Report of the Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday, May 16th 2023

Present: Full Council and 4 members of the public

Co-option of the new Parish Councillors

• Thomas East, Kay Gallagher, Bozena Kuncewicz, Gareth Peel were duly co-opted as Parish Councillors and welcomed by the Chair

Visitors' Questions

• A visitor voiced concerns over the poor footway reinstatement work outside Springfields. Clerk was asked to raise the issue with Highways

Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting and the Ordinary Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday 4th April 2023 were approved

Matters Arising

- Clerk was asked to seek an update on the Firs Farm situation
- Clerk reported problems with HSBC regarding changing the daily banking limit. Clerk and Cllr. Peel agreed to review future banking options
- A letter had been sent regarding pavement parking on lower Berridges Lane
- Council noted that the failed lighting on lower Berridges Lane had been scheduled for repair but would likely entail road closures
- Council heard that the blocked cemetery ditch had been reported to the housing association management and remedial work was in hand

Internal Audit

• Clerk noted that the 2022/23 Internal Audit had gone well, with no recommendations and a recognition of well-presented set of documents. Chair thanked the Clerk for his hard work in compiling the documentation

Pavilion Alterations - Update

- Clerk informed Council that a provisional grant has been secured to support the extension project
- Work had commenced on 2nd May. Breakthrough from the current meeting room to the extension is planned to take place around 10th June
- Council approved contribution funding towards a tarmac area to include two disabled parking spaces

Parish Memorials

- Council agreed to consider planting an oak tree as a coronation memorial. Siting options were discussed
- Council discussed sites to install the Knight family memorial bench, which is currently in storage
- Council noted the poor condition of the cemetery Burial Book, which had been in constant use since 1858. It was agreed to explore options and costs for its restoration

Removal of Dog Waste Bin in Welford Wharf

• Canal and River Trust advised that the dog waste bin at Welford Wharf was to be removed unless Council or another group adopted it. Clerk was asked to enquire if HDC would add this to our existing emptying schedule

Horticulture & Craft Show

• A request for a donation to the 2023 Horticulture Show, was received from the organisers, was approved

Old Green Notice Board

• Council noted that the post holding the notice board had rotted off. It was agreed to get a quote to reinstall this

Office IT Update

• Clerk informed Council that, following a number of issues with the office equipment, an IT contractor had been engaged to 'clean up' the system

Speed Indicator Device

• Council noted that the existing Speed Indicator is providing increasingly spurious readings. Council discussed the efficacy of the device and decided to make further enquiries regarding options and costs of replacement. Clerk to review grant options

Any Other Business

• Council discussed ways of profiling new and existing Councillors to make the public more aware of who is on the Parish Council. A number of options were tabled to be discussed at a future meeting

Date and time of next meeting

ALL SAINTS CHURCH NEWS

"The greatest among you must become like the youngest, and the leader like one who serves."

Luke 22 v26

This passage, in which Jesus sets out his model for the Kingdom of God, must have astonished his disciples, standing in stark contrast to the way Roman society worked. Roman society was very stratified and your place was determined by several factors; your ancestry, rank, wealth and political privilege, gender and, of course, at the very bottom came the slaves...

Life in Roman society was fixated on maintaining your status, and if possible, working your way up the social ladder. This way of life was in stark contrast with how the Kingdom of God was to work. Instead of a race to the top, the Kingdom of God is a race to the bottom. Instead of a race to accumulate money and possessions, is it a race to give them away. Instead of a race for authority and power, it is a race to serve others. It is an upside-down kingdom in which your place is not determined by who you can command, but by who you are willing to serve. Only a tiny minority, 1.3% of people in England, now attend the Church of England - we should get special funding as an endangered species! Because of this, many of our parishes are hanging on by their fingernails, with a handful of the faithful people desperately trying to keep the lights on and the doors open.

It is not sustainable - the Church of England expects a quarter of its churches to close in the coming two decades. Mostly small village churches, the church will disappear from the countryside and recede to the cities and larger towns.

We need to be a humbler and simpler church. The complex rules, structures, and organisational systems of the Church of England were developed for a large, successful and powerful church, which are unsuited to the tiny, struggling church we are now.

I hope we will also be a bolder church - a church where all Christians are confident about their faith. Where each Christian is both ready and able to witness to their friends and neighbours about how wonderful Jesus is, and share the amazing message of hope and salvation that he offers.

Actually, I think this transformation - if we can pull it off - will be the most hopeful thing to happen to the church in my lifetime. A new church is being born, humbler, simpler and bolder, that will be church in a new way. It is not going to be an easy, but it will be a life-giving journey.
