

You may have heard that Leicester City Council, under a Statement of Common Ground agreement, is putting pressure on the county districts to take extra housing that it claims it is unable to provide within its own boundaries.

This extra burden on local councils would be on top of their already agreed allocations, which are established in their Local Plans, and will further stretch local and especially rural transport, medical and social infrastructure.

What could this mean for us out in the 'sticks'? Well, for starters, if the proposal is carried, it would mean that Harborough would need to provide over 120 more dwellings over agreed allocations each year for the foreseeable future. This provision, due to constraints on suitable plots within the towns, is likely to spill out into the parishes, over-ruling any local opposition. Bosworth, being a designated aRural Centre will probably be on the front line for extra development. Our Neighbourhood Plan, made in 2020, did build in a degree of 'over provision' in future expansion and this will likely be pounced upon by developers.

The decision will now be deferred to the Full Council meeting on 11<sup>th</sup> December 2023. Watch this space... (any space!) For more bedtime reading go to: *www.harborough.gov.uk/councillors-and-council-meetings* 

### WASTE BINNED

Leicestershire County Council has recently opened a consultation period on their proposals to close three waste sites in the county, including Market Harborough's Riverside facility.

The proposals, which the council claim would save over £400,000 a year, also aim to change summer opening hours and close all sites over the Christmas period.

The Council argues that alternative sites are available within easy reach of the suggested sites ear-marked for closure to ensure impact on residents is minimal, and cite the newly refurbished site at Kibworth for residents who currently use the Market Harborough site. Residents likely to be affected by the proposals are urged to voice their opinions through the consultation process, which is open until Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> January 2024.

### WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

### **Dag Lane**

Whilst walking through Mowsley recently I noticed a street sign for Dag Lane. As we too have a pathway called Dag Lane, which runs from Mowsley Road to Berridges Lane, I became curious about the name and its origin. A little research revealed that a 'dag' is an archaic word for a clump of dung-encrusted wool hanging from the rear of a sheep! If this is the correct derivation of the path's name, it's intriguing to speculate how it came to be chosen...

There is a scattering of Dag Lanes across the country; including one in North Kilworth which completes our local trio. One final thought... perhaps we should call for our parish council to erect Dag Lane signs. After all, shouldn't we celebrate our agricultural heritage and recollections of sheep dung? Mike Chanter

Editor's Note: Further digging in the ether and Google maps reveals that the known Dag Lanes generally seem to be on the edges of their villages... hanging on the edge of the village, like a sheep's dirty trousers, perhaps...

Intriguingly these lanes are also predominantly dog-legged. So, the reference may relate to the dog-leg shape of the lane? Certainly our own Dag Lane seems to be a favourite with the local dogs!

Incidentally, our Dag Lane is on public land and carries the exulted status of 'highway' rather than a lowly footpath or even bridleway, which are permitted rights of way across private land. This designation gives our Dag Lane the same status as the High Street... or the M1!

### **BOSWORTH SKY AT NIGHT**

### Astronomy from your Backyard

The eagerly awaited Geminid meteor shower peaks on the night of 14th to 15th December. This peak of the richest and last major meteor shower of the year will provide us with a great opportunity to witness a fine display of shooting stars, if the sky is clear. It occurs roughly a day after the new Moon so, there will be no bright moonlight to spoil the celestial fireworks and you should be able to see even the fainter meteors. The radiant of the Geminids (the point in the sky from which the meteors appear to emanate when their paths are traced back) is very near to the star Castor in the constellation of Gemini. The display will be well up in the eastern sky by 9.00pm on the 14<sup>th</sup> and, at its highest, at a very favourable altitude due south in the early morning hours of the 15<sup>th</sup> for you hardy souls.

Unlike most meteor showers that are fine debris from icy comets the particles that make up the Geminids come from a rocky asteroid called 3200 Phaethon. Generally, rocky asteroids do not shed particles like loosely bound icy comets, and researchers believe that this asteroid may have been involved in a collision with another



object in space some time in its past. This violent collision then resulted in tiny particles now orbiting the sun which the Earth passes through each year in mid December, some of which hit our atmosphere at speed and create a meteor or shooting star.

The dazzling bright star in the south-eastern morning sky is the planet Venus which will put on a fine show throughout December. With the exception of the Moon and the Sun, Venus is the brightest astronomical object in the sky, so very easy to spot. The planet's dense carbon dioxide atmosphere has contributed to a runaway greenhouse effect making the surface searing hot. Not a nice place to take a holiday as it rains sulphuric acid as well! 

**BYGONE BOSWORTH** *Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection* 

Recently the future of the country's canal system has been thrown into jeopardy with the announcement of government funding cuts. However, the future of the canals looked far more perilous after World War II, when canal transport was increasingly being seen as out-dated, inconvenient, inflexible and unnecessary, and many waterways were being abandoned and filled in. As commercial trade declined, opposition to the closures was inconsistent and discordant and the whole navigable waterways system faced abandonment.



Arguably, this small line advertisement in the *Nottingham Evening Post* of August 14<sup>th</sup> 1935, saved the canal system that we know today...

The advert was for the sale of a former horse drawn *Shropshire Union Canal Company* working boat, the *Cressy*, which had been converted into a powered leisure boat by West Midlands engineer, Kyrle Willans. Willans sold Cressy in 1929, but bought it back when the then owner, Leicester journalist, John Fortune advertised it here for sale..

Willans was the uncle by marriage of a young Herefordshire engineer and writer, L. T. C. (Tom) Rolt. Tom knew *Cressy*, and later bought the boat from Willans to live aboard. With new wife Angela, Rolt started to travel around the declining waterways, noting with dismay, their sad and neglected state in a book that he wrote - *Narrow Boat*. The book was picked up by Robert Aickman, a well connected London publisher, who was similarly concerned with the potential loss of the waterways, and a meeting was arranged that led to the formation, in 1946, of the Inland Waterways Association.

With the backing of a prominent patronage, including conservationist, Peter Scott, industrial historian Charles Hadfield, prominent parliamentarian Sir A. P. Herbert and Lord Bingham (father of the infamous 7<sup>th</sup> Lord Lucan) the Inland Waterways Association galvanised public support for halting the closures, preserving the infrastructure and eventually promoting the reopening of many lost canals.

### Let's Talk About Love

One of the most profound experiences of love that I have ever had in my life happened when I first became a father, many years ago now. We brought our son Benjamin back from the hospital and my wife went off for a shower and I was sitting there on my own in the living room holding Ben, who was asleep in my arms.

Suddenly, out of nowhere, I was overwhelmed by a wave of love for my new-born son. To be honest, it shocked me. I had assumed that a father's love gradually grew over time - as the child develops, as he becomes a little person, as you start to be able to interact with him, play with him and get to know him. I had thought that it was at that point that a father started to love his child. But no, it wasn't like that at all.

As I was trying to process all of this, I heard God speak. "Stephen, if you as an imperfect human father can love your son so much, how much more do you think that I, your perfect heavenly father, love you?"

To think that the overwhelming love I was feeling for my son, was just a tiny fraction of God's love for me, it stunned me and in that moment, I suddenly realised that I had completely misunderstood what it means to be a Christian. If you had asked me at the time, "Stephen, do you believe in God?" I would have replied "Yes." If you had asked me, "Stephen, do you try to obey God?" I could have answered, "Yes." But if you had asked me, "Stephen, do you love God?" I could not have honestly answered "Yes" to that question.

And yet, I suddenly understood for the first time why Jesus said that the first and most important commandment was to "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength." What God wants is our love. When you love someone, what you really want from them is to love you back and God wanted my love. But then I was left with a question, "How can you love God?" I realised that I didn't know how. So, I started what became a 5-year journey of learning how to love God, involving a lot of prayer, a lot of reading, a lot of seeking out people who could share their experiences with me and help me. Gradually, slowly, I started to be aware of a love for God that was growing inside me, until I finally got to the place where I could honestly say, "Lord, I love you." The ultimate fact of our existence is that we are extravagantly loved by God. What God wants from each one of us is that we love him back. What it means to be a Christian, at its most essential, is someone who is trying to learn how to love God back.
