

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Grey Heron - Ardea cinerea

On rare occasions, you might be lucky enough to spot a heron in a statuesque pose on the canal bank; watching for signs of a passing lunch, though it is surprising they can see anything in today's turbid canal water. I recall as a youngster watching pike lurking amongst the reeds beside the towpath. Nowadays, however, the combination of boat traffic churning up the mud and fertiliser leaching in from neighbouring farms creates canal water with the opacity of builders' tea.

Evidently, herons have overcome this difficulty as there are approximately 13,000 breeding pairs in the UK and 63,000 overwintering birds. Nesting takes place in historical sites, called heronries. The largest such in Britain is currently at Northward Hill in Kent, where there are between 150 and 200 nests! Away from the heronry, they adopt a solitary lifestyle. Besides fish, (including those treasured individuals in garden ponds), they readily feed on a variety of creatures: small birds (ducklings), small mammals, newts, frogs, and worms. As photographers will know, getting close up photographs of these birds is difficult due to their extreme timidity - they take flight at the first sign of a human. Doubtless, this behaviour was genetically favoured in the past as fearless birds tended to end up on the banquet table! In 1513 Mr. Wynkyn de Worde wrote that this lean and stringy bird could be improved by "...sauce hym with vynegre, mustarde, poudre of ginger, and salte"! Currently, herons are a protected species...

The symbolism of the heron differs by culture. In China, it represents strength, purity, and long life. In Native American tradition the heron symbolizes wisdom and good judgment. In ancient Egypt, the heron was an icon of creation, while in Africa and Greece it was a messenger of the gods.

BYGONE BOSWORTH

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

There are many reports and much local newspaper coverage of the May Day festivities in Bosworth in the early 1900s. Clearly the event was in important fixture in the village

HUSBANDS BOSWORTH.

The annual children's May festival took place on Tuesday last, but owing to the adverse condition of the elements many of the Maybole dances, etc., had to be curtailed. Miss Nellie Wallace looked charming as the Queen of May. She was dressed in a frock of cream silk, and wore a crown of white flowers. The children were under the charge of the schoolmaster (Mr. Wilson) Mrs. Wilson, and Miss Clark. After parading the village, tea was provided in the school-room, presided over by the Rector (the Rev. A. Lamb), Mrs. Chamberlain, and the Misses Whiteman, Marsh, and Wells.

calendar at that time, and being crowned May Queen was obviously a great honour. Here, in 1910 we see 10 year old Nellie Wallis,



daughter of George Wallis, the licensee of the Red Lion Inn, in all her regalia. (Note the *Leicester Mail* misspelling of Nellie's surname!)

In the case of the photograph from the following year, when the weather appears to have

been more clement, the whole pageant and the May Queen's entourage, including a vast retinue of twenty-two Maids of Honour dressed in their finest, processed in a stately fashion around the village, the May Queen being transported in a gaily decorated bath chair. The procession on that occasion also included setting up the May Pole as a traffic-calming measure in the middle of High Street...



In 1917 the *Midland Mail* reported that '...the crowning of the May Queen is a time-honoured event and there is no falling off of interest'. May Day celebrations carried on throughout WWII when the evacuees from Kensal House School, London joined the village children, but the custom seems to have lapsed soon after.

In 1971, however, the *Harborough Mail* reported that it was revived and 5 year old, Sharon Perkins was crowned May Queen in an event organised by the PTA and the school, which included the May Pole Dance, handbell ringing and Lutterworth Morris Dancers.

There is a walled garden, a kitchen garden and a courtyard with a collection of over 270 miniature and very small hostas.

Thanks to the generosity of our garden owners and visitors the National Garden Scheme donated a record of £3,403,960 to some of the UK best-loved nursing and health charities, which included £76,000 raised by Leicestershire.



Cllr. Bolter chaired the meeting and welcomed the visitors.

Minutes of the 2023 Annual Parish Meeting were read and approved

Report on Parish Projects

- Clerk gave an overview on the major projects that had been undertaken in the parish during 2023.
- The main project was the Pavilion extension, which was part funded with Section 106 monies.
- The car park extension, including disabled spaces, was supported by a grant from the Mick George Community Development Fund
- Clerk gave an update on works to return Firs Farm to a working farm and acknowledged a generous donation of solar street lamps to light the pavilion car park and roadside path from the Firs Farm clearance team
- Defibrillators (AEDs) we now have access to three devices in the village and John Skelton, who is an Emergency Medical Technician and First Responder with EMAS attended the meeting to give an overview of the benefits of defibrillators

Questions and Discussion Session

- A visitor highlighted a blocked drain at the junction of Station Road and Welford Road which is causing a large puddle. Clerk to contact LCC Highways
- A visitor highlighted the car parking issues on Bell Lane that are causing large vehicles to have to mount the pavement to pass. Clerk to request an assessment by LCC Highways
- Chair thanked Councillors, Clerk and Caretaker for their work during the past year There being no further business the Chair closed the meeting closed at 8.25pm

When is a Church Poor?

In Acts 3 we read of an incident when Peter met a lame man begging at the gate of the Temple in Jerusalem.

Peter said, 'I have no silver or gold, but what I have I give you; in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, stand up and walk.' And he took him by the right hand and raised him up; and immediately his feet and ankles were made strong. Jumping up, he stood and began to walk, and he entered the temple with them, walking and leaping and praising God. For some people, for the church to have to say "I have no silver and gold" is about the worst thing that can be said. They feel it is embarrassing for the church to be poor. As



we look around the Hexagon Benefice, most of our churches are struggling to sustain themselves financially. Even all six of us together can't afford to pay a priest. We don't have much in the way of silver or gold.

But there is an interesting story of a humble monk who was being shown around a magnificent cathedral by a cardinal. This happened in the Middle Ages when the Roman Catholic church was at its zenith of power, prestige, and wealth. The cardinal pointed out the opulent building with all of its magnificent gilding and furnishings and he said to the monk with a wink, "We no longer have to say, I have no silver or gold."

The monk paused and then looked the proud cardinal in the eye and said, "But neither can you say, 'In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, rise up and walk.""

When is the church really poor? The monk knew a truth that the cardinal didn't. The Church is only really poor when she is no longer a place where God moves in salvation and healing. That is when the church is really poor.

I don't care how much money we have in the Hexagon, but I do care passionately that we should be a place where God's power in salvation and healing is seen to be at work. More than anything else, this is my prayer. Please join me in praying it.
