QUESTION TIME

The analysis of the recent parish questionnaire is in, and has thrown up some interesting results. Since the last exercise was carried out in 2018 a number of elements of the local demographic have changed radically.

In many cases changes directly linked to the after-effects of the covid pandemic in 2020. In 2018 only 21% of respondents worked from home on a regular basis. Today over 60% of respondents in employment work at least three days a week from home. This is also reflected in the increase in the number of businesses that are run from the village - no doubt also partly a reflection of the improved internet speed and coverage. However, mobile phone coverage, which was a major grievance in 2018, is still noted by almost three-quarters of respondents as poor or bad.

Other fundamental changes to the demographic come with the new developments that have been built recently, clearly bringing in younger villagers with families, the survey revealing that 25% of respondents are under 40 years of age, although those over 60 years of age count for half the population!

Despite recent improvements to the bus service, the car is still king, with 86% of people reliant on a car to access outside services and for travelling to work. When we come to location, unsurprisingly, respondents noted the rural location, but with easy links to the major road system. The sense of 'community' and village facilities and services; shop, cash dispenser, pubs, GP surgery and dispensary, all featured very strongly in responses, as did strong support for the village school and local pre-school facilities.

Understandably, traffic issues featured strongly again, this time around, with over three-quarters of respondents concerned about the speed and volume of traffic and HGV traffic in particular. Policing issues highlighted included the lack of visual presence policing and response to local issues, such as fly-tipping. Anti-social behaviour, relating to dog-fouling in particular, and low but significant, incidents of petty vandalism and fly-tipping were noted in many comments.

A public meeting to highlight the results of the questionnaire will be staged in the near future. Meanwhile, copies of the full report of the questionnaire results are available on request to the Parish Clerk.

LOCAL SHUFFLE

You may recall that in July we ran an article about Leicester City Council's proposal to extend the city boundaries into the district council areas surrounding the city, leaving the remains of the seven districts strung out like a 'donut' ring around it.

This carving up of the local authorities stems from a national government directive aimed at streamlining local government, cutting costs and duplication, and also the city ploughing in with the claim that they need the revenue and housing space from the extended area to balance their books.

The district councils, along with the County Council, for their part have countered the city's proposed 'land grab' with a proposal of their own, which would see the city remain as it is, with the county divided into two, north and south - 'north-city-south' option. This proposal would see Harborough, Hinckley and Bosworth, Blaby and Oadby and Wigston joining forces in the south of the county and the city staying put, in the middle.

The city has now come up with an even more controversial proposal to put to Government. The new plan, which would see the City, Oadby and Wigston, Blaby and Harborough amalgamated, has already been slated by the leaders of the affected councils. They claim that the mix of the rural and urban areas within the proposed county 'slice' would make administration irregular and complicated across such a diverse area, which would lump entirely rural tracts, such as Westerill and Starmore in the very south and Tilton in the east, with inner city blocks.

Cynics are suggesting that this is a ploy to frighten the local authorities into accepting the lesser of the City's two evils. Final, fully-costed proposals need to be with central government by the end of November... Watch this space!

From Action Fraud, Leicester

Beware of winter fuel payment scams

Since the announcement of the re-instatement of the Winter Fuel Payment to pensioners in April, Action Fraud has received nearly 3,000 reports relating to claim and payment scams via text messages. The scam has had a major effect already, with reported incidents alone totalling over £27,000.

Winter Fuel Payments are made automatically, you do not need to do anything. If you receive any text messages about how to claim Winter Fuel Payments, it's a scam. Action Fraud's general guidance to those receiving unsolicited messages of any kind, be they by text, social media or email, is to check that it is genuine before commiting to any further action...

Not sure if a message is real? Contact the organisation directly using the contact details on their official website, not the number or web address in the message. Remember, also, that your bank (or any other official source) won't ask you to supply personal information by email or text message.

If you have spotted any suspicious message, you can report it for FREE by forwarding it to 7726.

Lastly, if you think you've been a victim of fraud, contact your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud online at *actionfraud.police.uk* or by calling 0300 123 2040.

To contact your Dedicated Neighbourhood Team (DNT) online, use the quick and simple online contact tool - Search *Lutterworth Police*. You will be asked a few questions to make sure your query gets to the right place.

Leicester County Council have issued a scam warning following a spate of bogus text messages that have been reported across the county in recent months. The messages purport to be related to an unresolved PCN (Parking Charge Notice) and include a link to a payment service. The message urges that the 'fine' should be paid immediately, and warns of further action if not paid. The Council advises anyone receiving these 'notices' to ignore them and not to click on any links and reminds them that the local authoirty wouldn't have access to mobile phone numbers and any genuiine parking charge notices would be issued to the registered keeper by post.

WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

Buddleia

Although the greenery that was recently removed from the church steeple turned out to be willow-herb, the real menace in inaccessible crevices usually turns out to be buddleia, another of our non-native 'invaders'... As we see so often in invasive species, buddleia (buddleja) is vigorous, tenacious and hardy - often growing in the most inhospitable situations.

Introduced into England from the Caribbean as an ornamental shrub in 1730, and named in honour of the eminent British botanist Adam Buddle, the plant quickly established itself in our temperate climate. Over 140 subtly different sub-species have evolved within the buddleia family and their abundant and gloriously coloured flowers vary from white through lilac and mauve to an almost-black crimson, often with several different hues present in the same vicinity.

The plant favours brashy areas of low fertility, and is particularly keen to colonise abandoned waste ground and redundant buildings, establishing itself well in cracks and

crevices in dry stonework where its roots, in their quest for moisture, can soon cause serious structural damage.

Like many introduced species, buddleias have established an unfortunate and often well-deserved reputation as weeds and pests in many places. However, where they are controlled in a managed environment their flowers can be appreciated for their undoubted beauty and also their contribution to ecology .. their common name is the butterfly bush, due to their attractiveness to butterflies, bees and other nectar seeking insects!


Ongoing maintenance around the wharf area during the year has included work on the warehouse doors and timberwork and scrub clearance round the old lime-kilns area.



Christmas is for the children, so they say... So, here are a some seasonal snippets from the Historical Society Archive...

In 1992, over 60 parents and friends attended a special Christingle service, led by the Children's Society, where six year old Francesca Haigh-Lumby opened the singing of carols with the first verse of the classic, 'Away in a Manger', after which the rest of the junior school joined in. The service concluded with the distribution of fifty-six Christingles that had been made by parent-governor, Yvonne Durrant and school secretary, Miranda Eldridge. Back in 1995 the juniors at the village school put on two Christmas shows for parents and friends, 'Sleeping Beauty' and 'The Golden Goose' in the School Hall. In our photograph we see Mark Fountain, Ginny Haigh-Lumby, Luke Eldridge, Aggie Haigh-Lumby, Thomas Miller, and James Logan in full costume rehearsal.

The singing of carols by the children of the school is something of a tradition, although these days Carols in the Playground with mince pies tends to be a static display of festive bonhommie!

Even during the darkest days of the Second World War the children were 'doing their bit', out carol singing and raising funds for charity. On Christmas Day in 1940 Bosworth school children took to the streets, singing on street corners and outside homes and collected the princely sum of 16 shillings (£50 today), which was donated to the Lord Mayor's Red Cross Fund.

■ A visitor sought to open discussions relating to additional facilities for youngsters within the recreation area. It was agreed to seek further information and discuss this more fully as an agenda item at the December PC meeting

Minutes of the Previous Meeting were read and approved

Matters arising (for report only)

■Clerk was asked to contact the quarry operators regarding extending their safety monitoring to this area following reports of fast moving HGV traffic on lower Bell Lane

Digital and Data Compliance - Assertion 10

Clerk gave an overview of the requirements of this new addition to the external audit, specifically the requirement for data compliance and digital security

Planning Overview

■The October 2025 planning applications overview was presented and agreed

- ■After discussion with NP advisors it was agreed that the non-designated heritage assets that the group had identified would be protected by existing statutory measures
- It was agreed to review the results of the recent NP questionnaire and undertake a comparative analysis with the 2018 version

Any Other Business

- ■The untidiness of the planters, particularly in the High Street was raised and it was agreed to add this to the December agenda for discussion
- ■Clerk was asked to contact Leicestershire Police to follow up on the recent accident caused by a speeding vehicle in Bell Lane
- Clerk was asked to raise the issue of pavement and nuisance parking on Welford Road with the relevant authorities
- ■It was noted that the speed indicator device on the A5199 (outbound) appears not to be picking up vehicle speeds until the vehicles are almost past the device. Clerk to request the Highways authority check the alignment
- Clerk advised Council had received two notifications of interest in the Community Grant Fund
- A late-received request for funding from the Council's Community Fund could not be included in proceedings and would be added to the December meeting agenda.
